

St Aidan's Primary School Pupil Premium Expenditure Report 2018/19

What is Pupil Premium (PPG)?

The Pupil Premium was introduced in April 2011 and is additional funding which is allocated to schools to work with pupils who have been registered for free school meals at any point in the last six years (known as 'Ever 6 FSM').

The Government believes that the Pupil Premium, which is additional to main school funding, is the best way to address the current underlying inequalities between children eligible for free school meals (FSM) and their peers by ensuring that funding to tackle disadvantage reaches the pupils who need it most.

Schools also receive funding for children who have been looked after continuously for more than six months, and children of service personnel.

Nature of support for 2018/19

- The continued employment of an additional teacher in Y6 to ensure small group teaching and 1:1 tuition opportunities
- ➤ A fully qualified counsellor for one day a week to meet the needs of FSM children and other vulnerable children
- A part time teaching assistant to work in the afternoons with FSM children who also have been identified with additional needs
- > To continue to identify gaps in learning, track progress and organise interventions for vulnerable children. Ensuring all children make progress and reach their potential

Curriculum focus of PPG spending for 2018/19

School has focused on raising the attainment of the children in Year Six through increased targeted support from experienced teachers to ensure they are ready for the next Key Stage.

Extra teaching assistant support has particularly focused on reading and phonic skills and the outcomes for FSM and other vulnerable children.
