

St Aidan's Primary School Pupil Premium Forecast Report 2020/2021

What is Pupil Premium (PPG)?

The Pupil Premium was introduced in April 2011 and is additional funding which is allocated to schools to work with pupils who have been registered for free school meals at any point in the last six years (known as 'Ever 6 FSM').

The Government believes that the Pupil Premium, which is additional to main school funding, is the best way to address the current underlying inequalities between children eligible for free school meals (FSM) and their peers by ensuring that funding to tackle disadvantage reaches the pupils who need it most.

Schools also receive funding for children who have been looked after continuously for more than six months, and children of service personnel.

Extra teaching assistant support will particularly focused on reading and phonic skills and the outcomes for FSM and other vulnerable children.

There will also be a focus on writing as this is where the biggest gap is in all key stages between FSM and non FSM.
